Last year the Methodist Church Connexional theme for Advent was an 'Out of the Ordinary Christmas'. However, personally

speaking, it is Advent /Christmas 2025 that will be out of the ordinary. What is the reason for this? My sabbatical. This year I will not have the ordinary church based stuff of my Advent/Christmas. No church Advent candle lighting, no carol services with my regular congregations, no Christingle, no Christmas day celebrations with my circuit church family. Instead, I will be observing the time for personal refection and attending worship with an ecumenical flavour. This will definitely seem rather unusual. Many of us like our Christmas traditions – Christmas isn't Christmas without the Midnight service or without the candlelit carols. Jackson, who will chair the Circuit Leadership Team. What a blessing they all are to our Circuit – as well as to me!




Caring God,

Wow what a wonderful service we shared at the end of October 2024 with the Rev Debbie and the Epworth Wesley Worship Band as they led us as we celebrated our love and respect of animals.

Invitations and posters were shared with the community and the various groups coming to Church in the weeks leading up to the service. I for one, was really looking forward to this service - as like many folk, my most favourite place to be is with a furry four legged pet. After losing my beautiful Sprocker Spaniel, Jessie in June, the

invitation that I could bring her photo to this service and a blessing would be said over her filled me with great joy!

The service started as we looked at the sketch and imagined a cat who lived with the Holy Family (as depicted above by Da Vinci). We shared our ideas about a possible name for the cat and imagined it living with the family in the stable and following them around. Folk joining in with the service via Zoom were included in this conversation too as they were asked to text Rev Debbie with their thoughts (while her mobile phone was put on silent mode). Everyone in the congregation got to share the name of their special animal companions, whether past or present, and so the service felt deeply personal. What would an animal blessing service be without bringing in St Francis and learning of his life and works. We learned about William Wilberforce and John Wesley who were leading figures who promoted compassion for animals and were concerned with animal welfare. For some further reading John Wesley wrote an essay on the souls of animals in A Survey of the Wisdom of God in Creation. The General Deliverance – Sermon 60 - based on Romans 8: 19 – 22. Did you know that Christians were responsible for campaigning for the first legislation against cruelty towards animals and founded the RSPCA in the first part of the 19th century!

For those of us who have been blessed with the unconditional love and loyalty of a dog (s), Rev Debbie ended our service by sharing a poem that took us to imagine, "What if Jesus had a dog? The author imagined Jesus in Gethsemane and while the disciples slept, the dog was there awake and eager to be beside Jesus. Many a time in my own life, while my family have slept and I have stayed up praying late into the night, my dog has been there close beside me and so this poem was so relatable and really struck a chord with me. I found for days and weeks afterwards, I was able to speak openly with my friends and family about this animal blessing service and we openly shared our ponderings. Many of my friends and family don't come to Church and so its been a huge blessing to be able to connect and share my faith – our common ground has been our love of animals.

Next year, it is hoped that instead of stuffed animals, we'll be able to bring our pets to the Blessing Service. I can hardly wait!

North Lincolnshire Sanctuary Group

Thank you very much for all your generosity – we've been amazed with all the many donations; arriving so quickly following our appeal. You've donated kitchen items, mirrors, curtains, bedding, toys to name just a few. Thank you all very much, on behalf of our group and the families moving into our area who have lost so much; thank you for donating items to enable others to start rebuilding their lives; it is appreciated by so many. Thank you also for supporting our fundraising concert in November & for all the prayer support.

An event we've done this year is around kite flying which is an 800 yearold Afghanistan tradition, showing skill and cultural pride. Children make kites out of paper & try to knock each other's kites out of the sky. It was banned by the Taliban, alongside dance and music for a number of years.

In 2022 to mark one year since the fall of Afghanistan to the Taliban; people in over 30 cities worldwide participated in kite festivals celebrating the Afghan tradition. This was an act of solidarity, telling the world not to forget Afghanistan & its' people.

The Taliban imposed many rules including:

- placing restrictions on women & girls trying to erase them from public places.
- Those peacefully expressing views critical of the Taliban, faced disappearance & torture.
- Woman were banned from doing many jobs outside the home.
- Women had to have a male chaperone when travelling more than 72km.
- Beauty salons were closed down.
- Women were not allowed to participate in sports activities.

North Lincolnshire Sanctuary Group Joined in the kite festival in 2022 & since then have repeated it annually; raising awareness of Afghanistan & refugees.

Kites were made at the event by the families of refugees in our area. The children loved making them, colouring them and decorating them before flying them. You may have seen the display of kites at Ashby Wesley Chapel.

Please continue to remember Afghanistan in your prayers. For all Afghans who have had to flee their country. For all refugees all over the world, fleeing their homelands for many different reasons. Thank you for your support.

On Saturday 19th October five ladies from this circuit travelled to Stamford in the south of the county for the World Federation of Methodist & Uniting Church Women Day. Here ladies from many parts of the UK gathered to listen to and learn from Dr Nancy Day, a Kenyan opera singer and gifted communicator. Entitled 'Embodied Worship – Put your whole self in' Nancy introduced us to the joy and exuberance of Kenyan worship and encouraged us to use movement within our worship as much as we use our voices.

We sang the 'Hokey Pokey' several times to encourage us to move; we learnt songs in Swahili and attempted to move and sing those; we wrote new lines – in English – to a traditional Swahili song; we laughed, we were moved and we came away spiritually fed.

Methodist Women in Britain days are open to all and are times of fellowship, fun and learning. MWiB also has grant money available and I would encourage you to visit our website <u>www.mwib.org.uk</u> to see what is available to support mission at your church.



Christmas Traditions and Customs



The Christmas Pickle

The tradition of the Christmas Pickle has got to be one of the strangest modern Christmas customs, in

that no one is quite sure why it exists at all!

In the 1880s Woolworth stores started selling glass ornaments imported from <u>Germany</u> and some were in the shape of various fruit and vegetables. It seems that pickles must have been among the selection!

Around the same time it was claimed that the Christmas Pickle was a very old German tradition and that the pickle was the last ornament hung on the Christmas tree and then the first child to find the pickle got an extra present.

However, the claim that it's an old German tradition seems to be a total myth! Not many people in Germany have even heard of the Christmas Pickle! (Similarly in Russia virtually no one knows the supposedly Russian <u>story of Babushka</u>!)

Some families now have the tradition of hanging the pickle on the tree, with the first person/child to find it getting a present. But it probably didn't start in Germany!



Christmas Pickle Legends

There are two other rather far-fetched stories linking the pickle to Christmas.

One features a fighter in the American Civil War who was born in Bavaria (an area of what is now Germany). He was a prisoner, and

starving, he begged a guard for one last pickle before he died. The guard took pity on him and gave a pickle to him. The pickle gave him the mental and physical strength to live on!

The other story is linked to <u>St. Nicholas</u>. It's a medieval tale of two Spanish boys traveling home from a boarding school for the holidays. When they stopped at an inn for the night, the evil innkeeper, killed the boys and put them in a pickle barrel. That evening, St. Nicholas stopped at the same inn, and found the boys in the barrel and miraculously bought them back to life!

There is an old legend about St. Nicholas rescuing boys from a barrel but the barrel was originally holding meat for pies - not pickles!

So it's most likely that an ornament salesmen, with a lot of spare pickles to sell, invented the legend of the Christmas Pickle!

The American city of Berrien Springs, MI (also known as the Christmas Pickle Capital of the World) has an annual pickle festival held during the early part of December.


