Meeting up again after 36 years

The catering team at Epworth Wesley Memorial Methodist Church regularly provide hospitality in the form of lunch for visitors spending the day touring The Old Rectory, St Andrews Church, Wesley Memorial Church and other sites of interest in Epworth.

Many of these visitors are from overseas and recently they were delighted to assist in the reuniting of two former Methodist Missionaries.



Reverend Don Turman was visiting the UK with 78 other Americans from North and South Carolina. It was his 800 strong church who had organised the trip and he was accompanied by his wife and son Keith, who is also a Methodist Minister. Back in 1968 Rev

Don met the Reverend Jake Watson from England in Singapore. They were both on their way to Sumatra in Indonesia to start a four year tenure as missionaries for the Methodist Church. They both returned home in 1972 and Rev Jake decided not to return for family reasons.

Rev Jake joined the Navy and served as a Navy Chaplain for the next 24 years, including service during the Falklands War. At one point he was the only Navy Chaplain to be commando, jungle, parachute and artic trained.

He left the Navy in 1997 when he reached retirement age, and he could no longer parachute out of an airplane!

He then took a 'normal' Methodist job as a Presbyter in Southgate, London.

Rev Don went back to Indonesia several times after leaving in 1972, before returning to the USA permanently. In 1988 Rev Jake and his family visited Rev Don and his family at the Cherokee Reservation in North Carolina. They had not seen each other since then.

Rev Jake now lives in Ripponden, West Yorkshire and when Rev Don decided to visit the UK on the Wesley Tour, Epworth was the nearest place for them to catch up. Rev Jake's son in law Mark, kindly drove him over and they were able to spend the day together in Epworth, catching up after 36 years.

Action For Children Sunday at Yaddlethorpe on 14th July

155 years ago, in 1869, a Methodist Minister saw a group of children living under the arches of Waterloo station and was determined to help them. This was the beginning of Action for Children originally named National Children's h



Children, originally named National Children's Home.

Action for Children protects and supports children and young people, providing practical and emotional care and support, ensuring their voices are heard, and campaigning to bring lasting improvements to their lives.

Action for Children runs 426 services in local communities across the UK, in schools and online. They run nurseries and children's centres and help to protect children from neglect and abuse.



The local Action for Children support group meets at Ashby Wesley Church to discuss activities. They recently did a sponsored walk at Ashby Ville, and a coffee morning with various stalls is planned for September at Ashby Wesley.

The theme of this year's Action for Children Sunday service is a "A star in every child'. Action for Children's campaign focuses on how to get children's stars shining to make sure they have the brighter future they deserve.

Action for Children believes there's a star in every child. When a child has a safe and happy childhood, you see their star shining. It's wonderful. It's that twinkle in their eye. It's their infectious enthusiasm for everything. It's their curiosity, personality and imagination bursting to life. Right now, millions of children in the UK don't have the chance to shine. Their childhoods are overshadowed by abuse and neglect, poverty and poor mental health. Last year, Action for Children's wonderful supporters helped to reach out to

more than 600,00 children, young people and families. And they were vital lifeline for parents – both in person and online. There's a star in every child. Help them shine.

Laughton Chapel

It is some time since I have put pen to paper, or rather typed on my laptop, to report on events at Laughton. So here goes.

Laughton is the smallest church in the circuit, at least by

membership. It currently has only three members and is therefore in a class of its own, with Yaddlethorpe looking after events and its financial affairs. But it wasn't always like that.

In 1927 a 'new' chapel was opened to replace the previous one which was well past its best. It was opened by Colonel Frank Meynell, accompanied by Lady Dorothy Meynell. The Meynell family were of high standing and in fact owned most of the village at that time. The report appeared in the Gainsborough News of 25th November 1927 and refers to 'Yesterday's Ceremony at Laughton.' They must have been on the ball in those days! The report stated that the new chapel

was built on land kindly donated by Colonel Meynell. There is still some doubt about this land as no official records exist about it - only the newspaper report.

The old chapel, built in 1825, was retained as a Sunday School and remained as such until 1969 when the 'experts' declared it unsafe. The Sunday School was then held at the home of Joan and Royce Day, church stalwarts for many years, until a new Schoolroom was erected in 1975. It is still doing sterling service as a community room, although its days as a Sunday School have long gone.

The church today limits its opening to the first Sunday of the month, although there are extra services at the Church's Anniversary in May and Harvest celebrations in September. Following the passing of Joan Day in



2018 and Royce in 2020, it was remarkable that the church continued to offer worship. But with the help of members from other chapels, especially Yaddlethorpe and Ashby Wesley, the monthly congregation is now around fifteen. Joan and Royce's son, Paul, plays the organ both at Laughton and at Yaddlethorpe.

But finance is always at the back of our minds. The church can survive on a month-to-month basis, but unexpected financial demands cause problems. Nevertheless, it is hoped that worship at Laughton can continue for some time yet. There are currently two money-raising schemes being considered and I hope to report on these in due course.

If there are readers who have not set foot inside the church recently or indeed at all, then why not come to a Sunday service? The services are usually held on the first Sunday of the month at 4pm. Rather an unusual time, but at least it doesn't clash with services at other churches. Everyone will be made very welcome.

The church members had a vision that the site should be used, when the church closed its doors, for the good of the community, and it continues to do so, as the official opening saw the realisation of that vision (albeit with many ups and downs along the way) with a housing project for adults who can live independently but have support at hand.



Collinson Court is named in tribute to Mr John Collinson, member at RMC for over 50 years, a respected town councillor for Bottesford and then Scunthorpe, his legacy very evident in the honour paid to name the new housing facility after him.

A story of hope from Trey Hall's God of all update



A tiny rural Methodist chapel has seen impressive growth by embracing a creative approach to worship. Marston Methodist Chapel has just one room and no running water or central heating. Minister

Revd Gary Gotham said to the remaining members, "We all know what's going to happen: we'll either close the doors and put up a FOR SALE sign, or we try something different." So they downloaded a Christian mindfulness app and advertised 'mindfulness meditation sessions' in the village. Simply using a phone, Bluetooth speaker, incense and tea lights, Gary has led fortnightly Sunday evening worship that taps into a form of spirituality that is accessible for unaffiliated people, without hiding its Christian foundation. Attendance has gone from three to 18 people over the past 18 months, many of whom have no other church affiliation. These unaffiliated people are not card-carrying Christians and they're definitely not Methodists, but the worship connects with them and the church is now viable. "It's just the most epic way to finish the week," says Gary. "It's extra work but I go home just absolutely chilled out, and everybody just loves it." The church has found a way to be for the times we live in now. "Proper, proper proud of them," says their minister.

Some news from Scotter

It's been a busy Summer here in Scotter, on Saturday 22nd June we celebrated our 124th Anniversary with a 'Songs of Praise' themed afternoon service, fourteen hymns in all chosen by our congregation, ranging from the old favourites like Tell me the stories of Jesus through to more recent hymns. We were joined by friends from St Peters and the Grace Church, the service was led by Rev Paul, after all the singing the tea and cake which followed were very welcome, an afternoon enjoyed by all.



The Annual Riverside service took place on the evening of Sunday 28th July, arranged by the three Churches in the village, members of each Church took part in the service, a lovely service on a warm summers evening in a beautiful spot by the river Eau. The Riverside service has been taking place, weather permitting, for quite a few years now, we were reminded of a statement made by Rev Lyn Gregg, three

congregations but one Church. The next planned Ecumenical event will be a joint Harvest Festival. The service will be in the Parish Church followed by a Bring and Share lunch at the Chapel in October.

We have two Weddings on the Chapel calendar for August, it will be good to see our building used for these.



Update from North Lincolnshire Sanctuary Group August 2024

Thank you very much for your continued prayer support & generosity towards our work supporting refugees & asylum seekers across the region, this is a summary of our annual AGM report.

Support is given in many different ways - calling in to see people for a cup of coffee, being there for medical appointments, hosting a Refugee in their home, giving lifts, sharing food, sharing knowledge, teaching and having a laugh with them. In other words, being their friends. A number of refugees have been supported in finding volunteering opportunities, hopefully eventually leading into paid employment for example in hospitals & schools. A number of others have been supported in training for jobs for example taxi drivers. We raise awareness of the plight of refugees & asylum seekers through giving talks to local groups.

We benefitted from a very successful fund-raising concert at Ashby Wesley Methodist Church, a really lovely evening with musical performances and talks and the proceeds shared between ourselves and the



charity "Ukraine Fundraiser" who send donations directly out to Ukraine. We are planning another musical concert at Ashby Wesley Church on November 23rd – please keep the date in your diary for another varied, relaxed evening & hear about more of our work.

Refugee Week 2023, theme 'Compassion', was successful, with an Council wide Art competition for schools proving popular, a display of art and craft work done by Refugees in Vision 20/21, (one of the featured artists has now gone on to run art teaching workshops at the gallery and feature in a local art sculpture project), participation by 2 local schools in an art event at the gallery, a well-supported cake sale organised by Ongo and a multi-national Kite Making Party at Crosby Collective to finish the Week. The theme for 2024 is 'Home' and plans include another school competition with art including

photography, a project at Vision 20/21 to make homes from shoe boxes and display them, a sewing and embroidery project at Crosby



Collective and, of course, a kite party this time at Oasis Henderson Avenue. A group of refugees has been involved in decorating a statue of a horse, part of the sculpture trail project currently in Scunthorpe.

Each Thursday morning, we host an ever-growing group of ladies and small children of many nationalities, and we now offer not only friendship and English tuition but cooking activities, embroidery and gardening and recently support with Driving Theory Tests. We have also had trips out with 2 trips to The Deep in Hull and a trip to Brigg Garden Centre. Another group has now been created on Wednesday mornings, organised by and funded by Crosby Collective and many of the attendees will go to both events.

We continue to support the Ukranian community, and they have recently formed a Youth Club. They are running this themselves and we have helped with some funding for Christmas and Easter celebrations; as well as offering advice and support to help them gain further independence.

Our group has an ongoing relationship with a holiday provision called Back Dane in Derbyshire. We have helped with providing holidays for Ukranian and Syrian families and we are engaging with the Back Dane Charity to try to continue that work.

Other actions include supporting our three local schools of sanctuary.

In the final week before Christmas 2023 we had 2 surprise phone calls, one to say 40 food boxes were being delivered to my house and could we distribute them please, which we did, and another to say that Re-evolution had succeeded in gaining funding for 30 bikes for the local Refugee population complete with lights, a helmet, a pump and a lock. Over the course of January and February we worked with the Re-volution team and distributed the bikes to Refugees & Asylum

Seekers. Recipients were from Afghanistan, Ukraine, Syria, Eritrea, Iran and Colombia and the bikes were gratefully received.

Speaking of Asylum Seekers, 2023 saw the arrival of the first Asylum Seekers in any significant number to our area. These people have been placed into the Community in multi-occupancy housing and we have very little information available about who they are or where they are living. We have managed to make links with Crosby Collective, Crosby One, the Food Bank and North Lincolnshire Council and we are helping as and when we can, but it is a difficult area for us. We are encountering a new area of need in our region with homeless refugees, recently evicted from Home Office accommodation and looking for help. We are learning a lot!



Thank you again for all your continued prayer support and generous donations of money and goods for our work. It is appreciated by us and by so many people from across the globe.

Please keep the evening of 23rd November free in your diaries for the next fundraising concert at Ashby Wesley – more information to follow!

On that day 60 women and men gathered in the Rectory garden, in the sunshine, to learn about the Methodist Women's Collection. Academics Dr Ruth Slatter and Dr Hannah Worthern spoke about their research work using this feminist archive, started by MWiB in 2015, that provides valuable insights into the overlooked histories and stories of Methodist women working together and of faithful female friendships.

Opportunity to tour the house, view objects from the collection, share fellowship over afternoon tea and in worship with Rev Angy Long, Lincolnshire District Chair, brought this gathering of Methodist Women together.

MWiB hosted the second Mary Bosanquet Lecture in Leeds as a fringe event at Methodist Conference. This year's lecture was given by Chine McDonald, Theologian, writer and broadcaster on the theme 'Casting down the Mighty: Women and the mission of God'. This was a well-attended event, Chine was a very interesting speaker and the Q&A afterwards threw up some interesting discussion. Holiday Club August 2024




A four-day event held for children aged 5 to 11 to go on a **Deep-Sea dive** exploring Matthew's gospel.
